LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Pride in What We've Accomplished

We have many weeks to go before Thanksgiving, but as another school year begins, I find myself feeling so proud and thankful for what we've accomplished together in recent years. We're so proud of all our graduates — whether they're in private practice or pursuing careers on the administrative or academic sides of the profession. We're particularly thankful for the incredible continuing support they and others have shown both the school and our department through selflessly sharing their time, treasure and talent.

We're also proud of how the advanced program in periodontics has become a magnet for students from around the world. I count no fewer than 15 students who have come to our program from overseas and have subsequently returned to their countries to practice dentistry. At least an additional dozen students have come from elsewhere, but have subsequently decided to stay in this country after graduation.

These students hail from nearly every imaginable spot on the globe, including Lebanon, Greece, Brazil, Israel, the Netherlands, Taiwan, Iran, Palestine and the Philippines. In a world that's becoming increasingly interconnected, their presence among us adds a unique richness to the campus experience that would be impossible to achieve in any other way.

One of the crucial tasks in building and sustaining a solid academic curriculum in any field is finding the right balance between old and new perspectives, the right blend of research and technology on the one hand and more timeless professional knowledge and wisdom on the other. With all the advancements the field of periodontics has seen in recent years, especially in the area of implants, we've spent much of our time and energy teaching the advanced techniques to our students. But we're also equally intent on continuing to deliver the enduring lessons of our profession that will never change — dedication to the patient, a commitment to continuous learning and treating the whole person rather than only the mouth.

We're eager to hear from you and to stay in touch with all your news and accomplishments, so please drop me a note if you'd like. It was great to see many of you at the event in Seattle in September.

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If the hallmark of a good professional education is absorbing a blend of theory and research on the one hand, and hands-on practical mastery of skills, on the other, then Dr. Larry Frankel is a crucial element in the preparation of graduate periodontal students.

For nearly 20 years he has served on the faculty of his alma mater while simultaneously building a private periodontal practice in the eastern suburbs of Cleveland. Fellow faculty members say he's been a crucial part of their ranks. "With his vast knowledge of periodontics and excellent clinical skills, Dr. Frankel has taught the periodontal residents and cared for their patients in the graduate periodontal clinic with passion, friendliness, and kindness," says his colleague, Dr. Robert Skillicorn, an associate professor in periodontics.

Adds Dr. Leena Palomo, '00, '04: "He's a great guy, and the students are always very excited to work with him. He's a very good communicator and gets the material across so effectively."

Dr. Frankel's contributions were formally recognized this year by the American Academy of Periodontology, which conferred on him its Award for Outstanding Teaching and Mentoring in Periodontics, given to one periodontal educator at each school who has demonstrated a commitment to excellence in teaching and an ability to communicate enthusiasm to students.

Like many who eventually enter the field of dentistry, Dr. Frankel latched on to an early guide who helped introduce him to the profession. As an undergraduate at Miami University of Ohio, he recalls, "I had a friend whose father was a dentist. One day, he came down to school, and we talked. I remember thinking, 'I'd like to do that.'" His friend was going to follow his father's footsteps into the profession, but instead, he eventually followed a path into veterinary medicine, and Frankel went to dental school. He has no other dentists or periodontists in his extended family, but it is rife with physicians. His brother, two of his uncles and several cousins are medical doctors.

Two Separate Faculty Stints

He has served as an assistant clinical professor in the Department of Periodontics in two separate stints. He began teaching almost immediately after earning his graduate degree 17 years ago, and continued to do so for nearly a decade, as he slowly built his private periodontal practice through referrals from dentists. For a few years, the growth of his practice as well as of his family (he now has three grown children) prompted him to take a pause from his teaching career. About three years ago, however, he was at an event at which he bumped into Dr. Nabil Bissada, who invited him to return to the faculty. Dr. Frankel took him up on the offer.

He now spends each Wednesday working with about a dozen students. "It's all in the clinic, mentoring them on the technical skills," he explains. He says he sees the fruits of the new curriculum when he watches students navigate their way around the clinic. "By working with the students, I can see they're really well-trained. Each year, they get better and better." But he notes that the learning goes in both directions. "They really keep you on your toes," he says. "They ask probing questions about your treatment plans, and it keeps you thinking. It's very rewarding. I always tell them — 'I learn as much as you do.'"
